

For conferences, for festival or for holiday, Edinburgh is an ideal centre. In fact with its excellent hotels, and many fine public halls, Edinburgh the worthy Capital and beautiful city is gaining increased renown as a conference centre.

Many magicians, their wives and friends are taking the opportunity of combining a holiday with the convention and Edinburgh offers much in the way of history and colourful romance. It is a City where the historic past lives on side by side with the present, a City for centuries the home of Scottish kings and queens, and one which Sir Walter Scott truly described as "mine own romantic city". One can still savour the romance and the history in the Old Town on a walk down the Royal Mile from the Castle to the Palace of Holyroodhouse which is still a Royal residence.

There is an extensive and imposing list of places holding interest for visitors and the Edinburgh Corporation run regular tours throughout the City. Full particulars may be had from the Corporation Transport Offices in St. James' Square. The position of the city also lends itself to an infinite variety of tours using Edinburgh as a centre. British Railways also provide extensive tours throughout Scotland.

The Castle of course, from which the Old Town grew down the "ridgy back" to the Palace of Holyroodhouse, dominates the New Town and Princes Street. No visit to Edinburgh would be complete without a tour of the Castle.

Princes Street and its Gardens need no introduction, while the classic simplicity of the Royal Scottish Academy and the Scottish National Gallery are also worthy of a visit. Here are housed the finest examples of Scottish Art past and present.

For your additional pleasure Edinburgh has a really fine Zoological Park. The destination boards on the tramcars "To the Zoo" emphasize one of the City's most outstanding attractions.

Opportunities for principal sports are also wide, and Edinburgh has many fine cinemas, theatres and concert halls offering a variety of indoor entertainment.

CONVENTION HEADQUARTERS:-





TWENTY FIVE HISTORICAL MILESTONES. 1928 — 1953.

The International Brotherhood of Magicians, British Ring, is this year celebrating its Silver Jubilee.

Twenty-five years is a long time. History has been written over the years as the Ring progressed from a small, but very enthusiastic beginning. Looking back on the records one can always see an active spirit within the Ring, over the Pioneer days, over the ups and downs, and even during the war years when despite the fact that many members were called to active

service, the Ring was kept alive and many functions were organised.

The Ring was founded by Oswald Rae in 1928, and he remained the President until 1947. Names who come to mind in these early days as founder members are: Joe Rendell: Prof. Bofeys: Walter Kemp; Nelson Denys: C. H. Turner and C. Ducarel. Mons Ducarel passed away in 1939, and Nelson Denys gave up magic to enter the Church.

The first annual convention was organised by L. Bofeys in 1931, when the venue was Cheltenham. The next year we were again at Cheltenham, but in 1933 the venue was Northampton. Both in 1934 and 1935 there were conventions at Leamington Spa, then back to Northampton in 1936.

The convention in 1937 at Buxton had some significance for it was in this year that the first printed monthly "Budget" was issued under the Editorship of Levante. Subsequent Editors have been: Harry Kaye: Stanley Cable; Eric Wilson; Howard Denovan; George Blake, and at present Alan Kennaugh.

On through the years, and in 1938 the convention went to Malvern to be followed in 1939 with a Southport Convention. During the war years the membership which numbered in 1945 about 280 was closed, and on the opening again in 1946, the system of having Interrogation Officers was introduced. The result has been a steady increase in membership.

The first post-war convention was held at Hereford, and we subsequently went to Buxton (1947); Bournemouth (1948); Southport (1949); Harrogate (1950); Bournemouth (1951) and Hastings (1952).

The Ring owes a lot to the personalities in organisation. People like William G. Stickland who has been the Hon. Secretary and Treasurer since taking over from Dleisfen in 1932. He has been an influential figure in the I.B.M. and his work and keen spirit has lifted the Ring onto a high plane. It was a deserving tribute to Mr. Stickland that he was honoured by being elected President in 1950, and through the death of Harry Kaye he continued to act as Acting President.

The death of Mr. Kaye was a tragic loss to the British Ring for he too helped the Ring over a very happy and distinguished course. Since 1947 the badge of President has also been worn by Herbert J. Collings; John Ramsay; E. C. H. Wethered and John Gambling, all of whom are keen workers for the L.B.M. There are other men and women who are too numerous to mention, but all have played a big part in our progress.

The British Ring is noted for the introduction of many schemes and benefits to members, and their value can hardly be computed in only a few words of tribute. There is for example the good work of the Welfare Scheme and Benevolent Fund under the Welfare Officer, Eddie Dexter, a tireless worker in this capacity, and indeed in other spheres of Ring organisation.

The Ring goes on from strength to strength, and on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee it is appropriate that special messages be included here by Mr. Stickland and Ossie Rae.

Mr. STICKLAND, who this year celebrates his majority as Hon. Secretary and Treasurer, writes:—

The first twenty-five years are the hardest, it is said, and indeed, in the life of a human, this is a critical period, a time when character is formed and constitution built up. Having reached the first quarter of a century, the "child" rejoices that maturity has been attained, spares a thought for those who have protected, nourished and cultured at a time such attention was vital and makes useful plans for the future.

And so it is with a Society, and in particular our Society which is at this time celebrating its SHAVER JUBILEE — and what better way than with our first Scottish Convention. This would appear to be the time to pay tribute to all those members, many alas no longer with us, who have contributed in so many ways to the society's present strength, but unfortunately the space allotted to me makes it impossible to enumerate. I refer to those members who have given of their best as

committeemen, of the various Editors who have steered our "Budget" from its inception as a collection of hand-written letters to its present well printed form; of the convention organisers and the artistes, lecturers, appearing at same, to say nothing of the workers behind the scenes — all have given of their best to build up to manhood the bonny baby for which Messrs, Rae, Rendell, Bofeys, Kemp, Ducarel, Turner and Denys acted as sponsors 25 years ago. Our four surviving founders have reason to-day to be proud of their Society and our gratitude is extended to them.

A perusal of the convention programmes through the years brings to mind the names of many who did valiant work in the old days and more recently, but I must be brief so will confine my reminiscences to data collated from the FIRST CONVENTION PROGRAMME in 1932, an ambitious twenty page publication for a

society of only fifty-one members. Here we find photographs of our founder OSWALD RAE; our first Vice President, PROFESSOR BOFEYS, in whose garden the convention took place, our present President JOHN GAMBLING and President elect OSCAR PAULSON; T. H. CHISLETT; DONALD CROMBIE; RICHARD ARMOUR; JOE RENDELL; CHRIS CHARLTON, and a number no longer with as including HARRY KAYE and WILL BLYTH.

The various programmes include the names of a number of members still actively associated with us, including: WALTER KEMP; ARCHIE TEAR; JOHN RAMSAY; GEORGE DAVENPORT; GEORGE BLAKE; Wm. G. STICKLAND and Mr. and Miss TREE. Professor Bofeys and I are the sole survivors of the first convention committee which included also: Harry Kaye; W. Jeffries and Dan Bellman. We find Stewart James and Elmer Eckam, both with us at the Edinburgh Convention, among the prize donors.

A glance at the following year's Convention shows ERIC WILLIAMS on the bill and a full page advertisement from the Caledonian Magicians, including:—Armour: Dale; Ramsay; De Vega; Findlay and Duncan, which seems proof enough that it is time the Convention came to Scotland whose members have so loyally supported us since those days.

But what of the present and the future? In more recent years new members have come along to take the place of those taken from us and others whose activities have been curtailed and to-day the Society is most fortunate to have a committee and officers of the calibre of those early pioneers — men to whom work for the society is a labour of love. No one appreciates more than I do the terrific amount of work our Hon. Editor: Hon. Auditor: Hon. Assistant

Secretary: Committeemen: Interrogation Officers: Welfare Officers: Benevolent Fund Trustees and Convention organisers devote to the society and I feel with such stalwarts at the helm the future of the society is a rosy one.

In comparitively recent years our Benevolent Fund has been instituted and thanks to the generosity of members, especially those who have organised annual efforts for it, has increased so that to-day worthwhile aid can be given to those members in need and the more recently instituted Welfare Fund has and is doing splendid work to bring cheer to those laid low with sickness. We really are a Brotherhood in every sense of the word and it is a pleasing thought that despite the tremendous increase in size of our conventions, that same spirit of friendship that characterised those early small conventions in Professor Bofeys' garden still permeates our annual event. As long as this remains I have no fears for the future of our society.

Simultaneously with the growth of the British Ring has been the rapid expansion of the Parent Society and we pay tribute also to those who, by their untiring efforts, nurtured the small acorn to a mighty oak, as symbolised in the I.B.M. badge. Now with over five thousand members and Rings in almost every country in the world, the I.B.M. is the World's Largest Magical Organisation and we are proud to be an integral part of it. Our convention becomes more International each year and it is this International aspect which makes our Society different from all others. To the officials of the I.B.M. in America and to brother I.B.Mers in all parts of the world, especially to the American, Australian, Canadian, Dutch, French, Danish, Indian and Belgian Rings who are personally represented at this convention, WE SALUTE YOU.

OSWALD RAE writes:-

I can hardly realize that a quarter of a century has passed since first I founded the British Ring, many changes have happened in those years, but magic like Tennyson's Brook, goes on for ever despite the moaning of the dismal Jimmies.

The little acorn that I planted has grown into a mighty oak, the Ring is one of the leading magical societies, and it is with pride I look back over the past years.

and with happy anticipation I look forward to years ahead.

The good fellowship that exists amongst our members, the stalwarts at the helm who put in so much thought and work, ensures that in the future the Ring will rise to even greater heights.

Greetings to all our members, and special thanks to those who have made the Ring what it is to-day.




The fine record of service to magic of the British Ring is too well known to be mentioned again in a brief historical report. Regular conventioneers will easily recall the grand spirit of the event. New-
